Decline I support Climate Justice Taranaki's call to hold public hearings on OMV's exploratory drilling consent application and jointly process it with all related applications. International experience has demonstrated that there can be devastating environmental and socio-economic impacts across huge areas from exploratory drilling. New Zealand does not have sufficient on-site resources to cope rapidly with a major incident which could impact much of the west coast of the North Island and the top of the South Island, encompassing globally significant marine mammal and seabird habitats. The effects of undisclosed harmful chemicals to be discharged at sea cannot possibly be assessed. Climate change is real - New Zealand has the obligation to deliver its commitment to the Paris Agreement under the UNFCCC and the EEZ-CS Act must be amended to include considerations of climate change.
